The following are the due dates: It is the student's responsibility to hand them in ON TIME.

- 1. 1-2-4 (Quarter 1 Week 2 Day 4) Element(s)
- 2. 1-3-5 (Ouarter 1 Week 3 Day 5) Metal(s)
- 3. 1-4-4 (Quarter 1 Week 4 Day 4) Non metal(s)
- 4. 2-1-4 (Quarter 2 Week 1 Day 4) Compound(s)
- 5. 2-2-5 (Quarter 2 Week 2 Day 5) Water
- 6. 2-3-5 (Quarter 2 Week 3 Day 4) Pollution



These topics must be included on each journal card:

- A. Label the card with the general topic and the proper heading. (Name and date on top left corner.)
- B. Bibliographic information in MLA format: Assistance at http://writeforcollege.com Author (Last name, First name). "Title of article in quotes". <u>Title of magazine</u> underlined. Date: Page(s). Print.

Example:

- Damerow, Gail. "How to Choose Heritage Chickens." *Hobby Farms*. 20 September/October 2018:18. Print.
- C. Summary of article must contain: Author's point of view. Three points being made in the article. Your own words; choose an article you can understand.
- D. Evaluation of Journal. Overall **objective** statement about the magazine. Do not use newspapers or books. An objective statement is a statement that is undistorted by emotion or personal bias; based on observable phenomena without personal pronouns.
- E. Personal Reaction to the article.
- F. Articles must a date of publication after 2018.
- G. All journal cards must be on a 5 x 8 file card, use both sides if necessary.

 Use one whole side of the card. Any amaother size card is automatically deducted 20 points.
- NOTE: If using a website, the article must have been published in a recognized magazine. Examples: <u>Time</u>, <u>Discovery</u>, <u>Popular Science</u>, <u>Science News</u>, etc. MLA format of bibliographic information including website must be retrievable. A source for the correct use of MLA format can be found at: www.writeforcollege.com
